
THE ESSENCE OF CAMP

CONISTON HISTORY

As Camp Coniston celebrates the 50th anniversary of our home on Lake Coniston, and 30 years of support from the Witherell Foundation, here's the fourth installment in our four-part series ... the highlights of our last 50 years.

PART FOUR: Nancy LaRue Bonell Camp Director 1991–1999

N ancy LaRue Bonell's nine-year tenure as Camp Director saw the beginning of the incredible growth Coniston enjoys to this day. Enrollment numbers bear this out ... when Bob and Irma Sanders retired in '91, Camp had 876 campers. In 1999, when Nancy left to help start the Nutfield YMCA in Londonderry, NH, we'd seen a 25% increase to 1171 Campers.

Nancy grew up at a Y camp, beginning at Camp Nokomis on Bear Island in Lake Winnipesauke. She worked her way up through camper, counselor and staff. She began her lifelong career with the YMCA in



1979, at the North Andover Y.

But in the summer of '91, when Nancy came to Coniston, she knew there would be real challenges. "This was 'a time before technology' — no computers, no fax machine, no internet, no software, no



copier. Our registrar had to type out each and every camper contract, by hand! Introducing new technologies allowed us to bring some real efficiencies to Camp."

Cultural concerns

The history of organized camping has always reflected the times. YMCA Camp Coniston, like so many other organizations, was transitioning from norms that were set in the 1970's into a more child-centered philosophy.

In the 1990s, the study of "youth development" was in its early stages. Schools, camps and other youth-serving

organizations were shifting to a more broad-based view — one that advanced child-development needs on a wide spectrum.

"We were growing into a different era— a place where our kid's growth and development was placed front-and-center." Nancy accomplished this by bringing in key staff, and credits Colby Sawyer College in New London NH as a source of 'local talent.'

A new dining hall ... we share meals togetherl

The idea of a larger Dining Hall had been around Coniston since the end of the Sander's era according to Bert Myer, Board Chair, 92-98. Working together, Nancy and the Board decided the logical major step towards improving camp would be to build a new building capable of feeding all campers at the

same time.

Looking back, this really illustrates the childcentered philosophy Camp was beginning to take. Think of all the new traditions we have started at meal times — announcements, the traffic pattern, and even dancing after meals. These weren't possible when cabins

ate on a rotating basis in the old dining hall. The new building was opened for use in the summer of 1998.

The move to independence

At the same time, Coniston's Board of Directors had begun planning for a departure from the NH State YMCA, becoming an independent association of the YMCA of the USA. "Believe me, I had a quick lesson in 501C3!" Nancy laughs, referring to the laws that regulate nonprofits.

"We were worried about our mission, our practices, the whole 'financial piece' — we literally had to rebuild the entire organization of Camp. But we had some great talent to draw on, including Nelson McLean, the director of the New Hampshire State Y, and our own talented board."

Nancy began Coniston's first Annual Fund Campaign and a tradition of Alumni Picnics, which started relationships that eventually culminated in Coniston's Centennial Celebration.

"I know what I got from the Y as a camper," Nancy says, "and I'm so pleased I was able to bring that into Coniston's culture."

The Importance of Independence!

Brian Grip shares an historical perspective on the NH YMCA

Unless we could steer an independent path, parents would have no reason to send their kids here." That was **Brian Grip's** conclusion, as he watched Camp Coniston begin knocking on the door of independence. Brian served as Coniston's first Board Chair as an Independent YMCA.

This was a substantial turning point for Camp. We had begun transitioning from a unit of the NH State YMCA — reporting to them, having our finances controlled by them — to an independent organization, responsible for our own growth and success.

This gave Coniston the ability to respond to its needs more quickly. We could decide what buildings to renovate, what programs to create and how to change the staffing model to suit the emerging needs of Camp.

Brian says that the work of board members Bert Myer and Tom Simon was critical to this effort. "We had the right talent at the right time ... and it was a milestone moment in Camp."

Looking back there is no doubt this was the correct decision. "It turns out that we're now stronger than we ever predicted ... in a much better position financially, and with arguably one of the finest facilities in US camping."

GROWING AND DOING

From downtown Boston to West Virginia, Conistonians give back to the community

he immediate success of our initial Service Trips in 2013 told us that we'd have to expand the program. For 2014 we added a third trip — and for this one, we wanted to "keep it local."

The original concept began in the office. Camp Registrar **Lorraine Newcomb** was interested in the idea of providing opportunities to give back to the community and help take young people off the wait-lists.

John Tilley ran trips to the Appalachian Mountains of West Virginia and Virginia while working at camp during college, and he knew how beautiful it was ... and



how much help was needed. It was the perfect place to begin sharing Coniston "on the road." So the original trips ran to West Virginia to work with Habitat for Humanity, and Virginia to work in the Feeding America regional food bank.

Once again this summer, Coniston campers volunteered in those organizations, but we added a local trip to Boston. What follows are the thoughts of **Caitlin Elgert** and **Beth Cairns.**

Caitlin returned to work on the HFH trip, and Beth Cairns worked with all three trips. Both are educators during the remainder of the year, but returned last summer to lead campers and make an impact, and to reconnect with the magic of Coniston themselves.

SERVICE TRIPS 2014:

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY Franklin W.Va.

he first service trip returned to the hills of West Virginia to continue our work with Habitat for Humanity. Conistonians donned safety glasses and ran power tools, as they worked at HFH sites around the area.

To assist in the trip, **Caitlin Elgert** came back for two weeks, after having been gone from the camp staff since 2011. Caitlin has been living and working in the Boston area since she graduated from college. She was quick to point out just how hard our kids worked. "Some of these kids had only been to Camp for a summer or two, and were digging trenches for concrete forms, hauling lumber, leveling driveways ... in the first week of July, in West Virginia!"

But Caitlin says the sense of accomplishment was worth the effort. "The kids went in with a great attitude, really eager to jump right in. In fact, one of the lessons we shared was, we had to learn to slow down, and



remember — a house isn't built in a day!" But the group did get to celebrate after finishing one of their biggest projects, by holding an impromptu "dance party on the deck"!

"The kids really took away some lessons," Caitlin says. "We had dinner with the families we were building the houses for ... and you could see it in our kids faces, realizing these people are facing challenges that they've never experienced.

"It shows that a small group of teenagers can make a difference ... the power of great kids!"

Boston Rescue Mission and The Mather School, Boston Ma.

We always knew there are important needs in our own back yard. This year **Coniston in the Community** made the "short" trip to Bunker Hill in Boston, where

Bunker Hill in Boston, where we supported the homeless, and worked to renovate school facilities in low-income areas.

For many Conistonians, the city of Boston is 'right around the corner,' and we might think of Bunker Hill as just another tourist destination.

But participants had the opportunity for another view ... a place where people make their homes, and face the challenges of urban life.



For this trip, Campers lived at the 1st Church of Charlestown, and worked at facilities around Boston Common. We helped renovate The Mather School, the US's oldest elementary school, and worked in kitchens that fed the homeless.

"These were powerful experiences for our kids." **Beth Cairns** says. "We'd challenge them to sit and talk with the people in the community, and we'd ask them, 'What did you learn about yourself, about society?' Their reflections would bring us to tears."

"This was a chance for our kids to figure themselves out, to

This paired perfectly with the Feeding America Trip to Virginia. Hunger is an issue we sometimes forget occurs in the United States. Seeing the regional operation in Virginia and kitchens close to home in Boston reminds us that the opportunity to give back is one we should all look for often.



Camp Must Not Become A Privilege For Only The Privileged

HOW DONATING TO CONISTON CAN HELP YOU RECOGNIZE PHILANTHROPIC GOALS, NOT CAPITAL GAINS.

IN 1984, when Carl Witherell set aside part of his estate to send local kids to camp, we had no idea what impact this gift would make on the Upper Valley and Coniston. Since that time, this gift has sent more than 1500 children to camp.

In 2011, the Board of Directors established the Centennial Endowment with money raised from the celebration with many of the same goals in mind.

Because Coniston is a non-profit, your gifts are tax free and if structured correctly, you can avoid some or all of your capital gains and receive a full, fair market deduction.

By taking advantage of these tax benefits, you can help Coniston help more kids than you ever thought possible.



REDUCE INCOME TAXES: As

with all gifts to Coniston, your gift of capital assets qualifies for a full, fairmarket value, charitable deduction from your income taxes. You can take a deduction of up to 30% of your adjusted gross income in the year of your gift and carry it forward up to five years.

AVOID CAPITAL GAINS

TAXES: Giving appreciated capital assets will allow you to not recognize any taxable capital gains. You take the full, fairmarket value deduction and Coniston gets the full benefit of your gift because Coniston is taxexempt. Even if you have only modest gains in your stocks, it's still nice to be able to avoid paying tax on the gain.

AVOID ESTATE TAXES:

By removing these assets from your estate, you not only reduce income taxes and avoid capital gains taxes, but you lower your future estate tax liability. This can help you distribute much more of your estate to family members and charity and less to taxes.

"The Coniston CIT program empowers our kids to become the leaders they so much admired as Campers. The goal is to discover who you are, what you want to become ... and how you're going to get there."



We hire great staff to lead our trips, but we've also discovered a real need for a third adult member.





"When you're at Camp, you're in 'Coniston-land.' Away from all the normal distractions of life. It's magic."


Thank you for saying that, we couldn't agree more! We all know technology is wonderful ... but it's also important to slow down, and learn to appreciate the here-and-now.
