There are people in life who quietly go behind the scenes and make things happen. Erma Sanders and Sherm Horton Jr. were those people. The Coniston Community is missing both after their passing away this past winter.

Erma Sanders helped direct Coniston, quietly and unassumingly, with her husband Bob from 1969 to 1991. Her impact on creating the Coniston Community was immense.



Sherm Horton Jr. and his wife Judy would underwrite any CIT experience for a child who couldn't afford it, for

the past 15 years. In fact Sherm and Judy paid for **Rachael Jennings** and **Carter Bascom**, who are featured in this *Chronicle*.

As a rule we don't talk about which of our kids receive Camperships. The summer staff doesn't know, other campers don't know ... sometimes, even Campership kids themselves don't know.

This is intentional. We want Camp to be a welcoming community, where strengths and differences combine — ages, religions, geographic and economic backgrounds. It's the *blend* that creates an environment where we discover something new, and learn and grow.

THE LIFELONG IMPACT OF A CONISTON CAMPERSHIP

Every year, members of the Coniston Community donate

to campers through the Coniston Annual Fund. Some send ^{\$}25, others ^{\$}100, while some are fortunate to be able to send one, or even several kids to Camp.

This has been the case in our Community from the beginning. Donations have always ensured Coniston is vibrant and that anyone is able to attend.

We imagine this generosity may be forgotten by donors — but your money impacts individuals. In fact, it made its way into Rachael and Carter's childhoods, and quite literally changed the course of their lives.

In turn, they impacted Camp and every child who attended.

Rachael Jennings

Coniston Camper, Girls Camp Director

Rachael says her cousins Martha and **Stan Rigby** got her interested in Camp ... "I learned the Coniston Clap and our favorite songs before I ever got here!"

Rachael and her sister Sarah grew up near Philadelphia, "... and Coniston was *magical* to us! Clean air, a beautiful unexplored place — the first time I ever saw the stars at night was at Camp! This place let me explore what I loved, and it was a total privilege being there."

Rachael wasn't really aware she was on a Campership for her CIT year ... "I kind of felt like, coming from Pennsylvania, the other kids thought we dressed differently because maybe we were Amish!!

"But I know people made sacrifices to send us here. Without those Camperships I would have never known how transformative Coniston could be, and how much it ended up guiding my life."







Rachael Jennings and Carter Bascom tell us how their Camperships at Coniston changed their lives.

Rachael became an East Coast CIT ... "I still remember that Mt Washington Climb, we hiked Mt Monroe and saw the sunrise! And I started a bit of Coniston tradition with that great quote from *The Lorax:* 'Unless someone like you cares a whole awful lot, nothing's going to get better, it's not.'" To this day the CITs read *The Lorax* on the trip.

That philosophy of caring "a whole awful lot" shines through in Rachael. She returned, summer after summer until she became the Girl's Camp Director. Her care and attention changed Camp and everyone in it. Rachael is a nurturer and she brought that to homesick campers, programs, and all of Camp.

On her climb up Mt Washington, her CIT Director **Molly Jepson** wore a "Love Middlebury" T-shirt. That shirt, that friend, and that climb got Rachael interested in attending Middlebury College in Vermont. After college, Rachael became a teacher in an all boy's school. She just accepted the English Chair position at the Dublin School in Dublin, NH.

All this change through Camp ... all this change to children ... all this change because of a donation.

Looking back, Carter knows that he was fortunate that his parents pieced together a way for him to come to Camp, when not attending was a real possibility. "I kind of knew it was caused by circumstances outside my control, my parents divorced when I was young and it was hard to afford Camp after that.

"But I'll tell you, Coniston was always my 'haven' — the place where I could let everything go. It was only 20 minutes from home, but for me, it truly was another world."

The examples of Camp, the caring people, the sense of community — these things impacted Carter immensely. Carter was a mainstay in Boy's Camp, impacting campers with his enthusiasm and care. He eventually directed Coniston's Adventure Camp program.





Carter says his parents told him years ago he was coming to Coniston on Camperships, "and now, I realize there were people, right in this community, who will pay to support kids like me. It's what brings me to volunteer, to work with kids myself ... it completely changed the way I view people, my local businesses, friends and neighbors."

Looking at Carter's life now illustrates how it changed him. After graduating from UNH, he became the Program and Special Events Director for the New London Outing Club, a local non-profit working with kids to bring them the outdoor experience. Carter also gives back to his community as a Kearsarge School District board member.

Because of camperships, because of Camp, because of donors, Carter spends his life giving back. "If I hadn't had the experience of being on Camperships, and realizing that people in my local community made it possible, I would not be doing what I am today."

n 2013 **Jessica Lahey** began working on an article titled "A Summer Camp Lesson: Good-Bye And Go Away, Thank You Very Much", based on her experiences dropping her son Ben off at Camp Coniston.

Two years later she's been published in *The Atlantic, The New York Times* and *ACA Magazine,* she's a radio and TV commentator and blogger, and she has a newly-released book now on the shelves. Jessica Lahey, Nationally Published Author (and Proud Coniston Parent!) Talks About Independence, Strength, and the Power of Good-Byes at Camp

In March she was the key-note speaker for the American Camping Association's national conference in New Orleans.

"I grew up as a YMCA camper, starting at age 12 with my sister at Camp Chimney Corners in the Berkshires. But I've also been a teacher for many years, and I began to realize that both experiences gave me a very unique perspective.

"Camp is not school!", Jessica states emphatically. "First, it's a place where you can shed the baggage that follows you through school. Second (and this seems obvious until you consider it), *parents aren't there!* Parents can help to sustain that reputation.

"So camp becomes 'a clean slate


without any influence from home', where kids can explore and take the necessary risks to grow.

An update from **Zach Zimmerman:** "I started a new job in November, working for Naviance by Hobsons. We


help students achieve their post secondary goals."

Scott Sanders says one of the more enlightening moments of his mother's memorial service was when **Howie Kalfus**, who worked with his parents, came up to pay his respects.

"He told me how apparent it was that Mom and Dad were always a team, and how aware he was of their partnership. But he also said, over the years, he began to realize how much Mom 'kept it together' in the background while Dad was running Camp.

"Did you know," Scott continues, "that for most of the time Mom and Dad were at Coniston, they ran the camp with *one maintenance person?* Mom did the work of three or four people ... she was Registrar, she was Secretary, she did the bookkeeping, she made sure people paid their bills ... and at the same time, she had a full-time job working at Stevens High in Claremont NH as a secretary during the off-season!

"Then during Camp season she helped run Camp, she did whatever needed doing. In all the years I remember them directing Coniston, they rarely took a night off ... that was a *real* occasion!"

One of Scott's fondest Camp memories of his mom was **Erma's Garden.** "Right outside the office Mom created a big flower garden that she tended and maintained ... a beautiful addition to Camp."

John Tilley says, "This was a beautiful 'working marriage' of over sixty-three years, and Coniston was the

beneficiary. When I reached out to the family after Erma's passing, it was so clear to me that her life was defined by the contributions she made to Camp ... and ultimately, to society."

Sherman Horton Jr.

NH Supreme Court Justice, Coniston Parent

oniston parent and alumni **Sherm Horton III** clearly sees his father as a man of accomplishment. "Dad did his undergrad work at Dartmouth, graduated from Harvard Law, established a private practice in Nashua, and was on the state Supreme Court ... you'd expect he'd be pushing his kids toward his career.

"But that was the thing about Dad — he never pushed. He was always extremely open, and encouraged us to follow our own paths, and he saw Coniston as a great place for us kids to grow up."

Sherm Jr. was very much involved in the New Hampshire political scene. He was a partner with Hugh Gregg, former NH governor and father to Congressman Judd Gregg, and he actively participated in the Youth in Government Program, sponsored by the NH YMCA.

But the Horton family is also woven into Coniston history. In 1963 **Judy Horton**'s brother in law helped facilitate our original land purchase here at Coniston, and Judy was a board member for 20 years.

Coniston recognized the Horton family's contribution by dedicating **The Horton Pavilion** to Sherm Jr. and Judy in 2001. "My parents wanted to create a multipurpose space that was weather protected." Sherm III says, "Also, in that day, all-camp events were held in the Main Lodge — tight quarters! The Pavilion was a gathering place where we all could congregate."

Sherm III says his dad was very modest. "At his memorial, people I never knew kept coming up and telling me what a mentor he was to them. For the things he did, he felt it was a service ... something he did to 'give back.'"

As a side note of interest, John Tilley says that Sherm Jr. and Judy Horton paid for both Rachael Jennings and Carter Bascom's CIT trips! CONTINUED
