
f you were to ask staff and campers what improvements were made to Camp last year, almost every person would say boy's camp was improved with six new cabins.

Building the New Boys College!

Calcutt Family makes a valuable contribution to Camp's future



The footings are in! Our new Boys College begins to take shape.

hen we look back at the history of Camp Coniston, there have always been people committed to keeping Camp successful far into the future.

John and Ann Calcutt are two of those people, and this year they designated a most generous gift — a \$100,000 contribution to rebuild the Boys College.

Simple, but so important

John and Ann's family is deeply involved with Coniston. John is our current board chair, and his family has been coming to Camp for twenty summers. "Our oldest son is 30, but he began at Coniston when he was 10 years old, and now we're seeing our nieces and nephews come to Camp. When

something becomes so much a part of the fabric of your family, you want to do something out of gratitude."

"I guess there are projects that have more cachet, but a contribution like this makes an impact far into the future. It's like the campaign to buy the land a few years ago — if we hadn't done that, it would have changed the character of Camp forever."

Some real improvements

The new Boys College will be laid out in a similar fashion to the Girl's College, which was constructed in 2005.

We learned a lot rebuilding the Girls College, and we'll have more showers, improved ventilation and

But why 'College'? The most common, and tongue-in-cheek idea, comes from the time-honored tradition of "a place where one gets their best thinking done." Some even claim they get their best ideas in such prestigious locations!

But the other idea, and most likely, has to do with the era when Camp was founded. At the time, the word college was used in the same manner as "collegial" — to come together. People have always come together to brush their teeth at the begining and end of the day, wash up before meals and meet outside this traditional gathering spot.

So okay, Conistonians — to the Colleges we shall go!

Each day, office staff would call Nelson to process finances, write checks, pay bills, or answer a historical question. Even though he didn't work on site, Nelson could tell you exactly when the Camp built the climbing tower, purchased a new tractor, or even built a new building.

Because of his time and dedication, his work was invaluable to us all.

Board of Directors honor 32 years of service to Camp Coniston and New Hampshire YMCAs with endowed campership

— and Nelson's service illustrates just how important every job is to an organization. By stewarding the Camp's finances, he impacted every camper and staff member who has ever walked through our gates.

His "personal mission"

Nelson described the growth and development of children as "his personal mission in life," and a quick look at his long career of service confirms this. Nelson was the headmaster of a private boy's school near Rochester, New Hampshire, when he joined the State YMCA Executive Council in 1983. In just a short time, Nelson became the Executive Director of the State YMCA, of which Coniston was a part.

In this role, Nelson administered the bookkeeping for the entire organization. After stepping down from the Executive Director position in 1995, he assumed the role of Coniston's bookkeeper — a position which he held until last year.

Nelson's long service to the YMCA is the reason the Board of Directors decided to honor his contribution through a permanently endowed Campership (see right.)

The DHART team provides ground and air medical transportation services to the medical communities of Northern New England, and will transport to the closest Trauma Center in the region's five states.

Lee Fitch Price

Coniston Staff and Parent

Lee Fitch Price passed away September 29, 2014, following several years of declining health.

Lee was secretary in the YMCA office in downtown Claremont for 10 years, working the first three years for Doug Reed and the last seven years for Bob Sanders.

In 1970, Bob asked Lee to work in the Camp Office during the summer season, and for the next seven years the Fitch family happily spent their summers at Coniston.

Lee's children, Karen, Steve and Kevin, rose through the ranks from campers to staff between 1967 and 1977. Lee's

husband Stan, though not on the Camp staff, volunteered in a variety of capacities every summer. Stan passed away in 1985.

The family remembers those summers fondly. Karen's one regret: "I wish I'd written to the Camp office last year, so that these two office ladies, Erma Sanders and my mom, could have been featured together in memoriam in the Spring 2015 *Chronicle."*

Coincidentally, the two women, who worked together for seven summers, died within four months of each other.

Lee's children, now all back in Claremont, NH, where they grew up, often reflect on their many happy memories of Camp Coniston and are thankful for the YMCA camp experience.

As a tribute to their mother and those happy memories, they have scattered some of Lee's ashes in various places on the Camp property.

During their visit, in a statement he had heard before, they told John Tilley that Camp Coniston had always been their family's "heaven on earth."

Karen and her brothers welcome correspondence from anyone with whom they enjoyed the camp experience during the same years.
