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
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## DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

Armed with the most recent neuropsychology research, we openly made these three human requirements the theme of staff training during the past two years. It felt so new. It felt so informed. In an age of increased teen, mental health problems, it felt so timely.

As we wrote this issue of the Chronicle, it became apparent that Belonging, Connecting, and Achieving aren't new to Camp at all. They are the foundation of Camp. We have always tried to teach young people to be open, be themselves, and to love one another. The result is why campers would often say that Coniston is the only place where I can be myself only to then say they had made the friends of my lifetime. Even in 1919 the Camp's brochure said: It is the aim.... not alone to provide the "best time ever" for the Campers, but to make the weeks they spend there worthwhile from an educational point of view.

Coniston's alumni illustrate how the lessons of Camp continue long after our campfire has burned down. Their examples inspire us the same as our favorite counselor did—by showing us possibilities. For us all, isn't the word possibility just another way of saying hope?

Hope.

Hope is such a big word.

Society requires more hope, but that seems to be in short supply these days.

This issue more than ever before illustrates the difference we make in each other's lives. Young people enter as campers and there is an arc that ties us all together as we return, again and again, to make a difference, just as a difference was made in each of us.

When I look at our incredible alumni community, I see a group of people who take their sense of hope into the world and translate it into their lives—healthy relationships, new families, careers, happiness, connections, and a sense that they belong.

Without each of you, our community wouldn't be the same. We have built something so strong, that's filled with love, trust, and respect for one another. This is precious. We are raising the next generation and every one of us has a part to play. As you read through this Chronicle, I hope you are reminded of the special community you are a part of and the good we are all doing for our children's futures.

Each one of us can make a difference. But together we can make change. I *hope* you will continue to help.

# LESSONS FROM THE CHEYENNE INDIAN RESERVATION

Every CIT Session is special but as alumni know, we are always trying to make every program's lessons more meaningful.

This summer, our West Coast CITs traveled to YMCA of the Seven Council Fires, on the Cheyenne Indian Reservation in South Dakota. The Lakota people welcomed the CITs to their land, gave them language lessons, and invited them to a private Pow Wow.

In return the CITs helped build cabins at the reservation so they could offer more camp to more kids. CITs also spent time working with campers at YMCA Camp Marrowbone developing leadership skills within a camp environment very different than Coniston.

CITs returned to Coniston with a deeper understanding of the importance of camp in introducing individuals into a larger community. It was a different program in a unique setting but the shared good work done by both our YMCAs is life changing.

### **THREE GRANTS FUND 21 CAMPERSHIPS**



YMCA Camp Coniston was the recipient of an **Eastman Charitable Foundation** grant that funded three children from Grantham, Enfield, or Springfield. The local children were all selected by their school counselor and all three loved their first Coniston summer!

Camp was the recipient of a **YMCA of the USA's Strategic Initiatives Fund** grant which provided fifteen children from diverse backgrounds a Coniston Experience.

# ALUMNI PUT ASIDE BUSY LIVES AND RETURN TO LEAD TRIPS

There is an old adage that "from whom much is given, much is expected." At Coniston we view that expectation as a form of gratitude. It's the reason behind the creation of the Service Trips and our alumni are modeling thankfulness when they return to work with teens in all of Camp's trip programs.

This summer a record number of twelve alumni took time out of their careers to lead trips. These alumni shared their leadership skills with campers while visiting incredible, awe-inspiring places along the East Coast and in Canada.

Midcoast Habitat for Humanity in Maine was the first Service trip where Conistonians spent the week helping to build a house for a family having difficulty in affording a place to live.

A second trip ventured to Block Island Maritime Institute (BIMI) in Rhode Island to assist with marine life care, tank maintenance, and beach cleanup. Campers learned about environmental conservation and solutions they could take home to address these issues in their own communities.

Through the Quebec Quest trip campers immersed themselves in new cultures and explored what it means to be a global citizen. Thanks to all our alumni trip leaders for choosing to impact lives of others during your summer.



Washington Resort, Woodstock Inn, and the Equinox Hotel. This experience ensures that their time spent in America will also improve their lives upon returning home.

### **SUMMER FELLOWSHIPS**

Coniston offers fellowship positions to engage staff's academic knowledge and leadership ability for the betterment of the Camp Community. This year, **Ava Berger** and **Libby Foley** were awarded college scholarships to be Coniston Fellows.

Ava, studies journalism and communications at Boston University. By watching Camp from the inside as a cabin counselor, Ava was able to write the untold stories of Camp. She wrote blog posts, attended alumni events, and even created an "Ava edition" of the Coniston Ambassador Newsletter.

Libby, a psychology major at Kenyon College worked closely with Coniston mentor, Caroline Beale, a professional market researcher. Libby used her coursework in research and child development to create a questionnaire to quantify the impact of relationships at Camp. Libby's study includes two surveys for approximately seven hundred participants. Many campers received the second part of the survey in October. Libby hopes to share her findings and make recommendations to Coniston and other camps around the country.

We had an amazing treat this summer with artist in residence, Jimmy Reed! Jimmy has a long connection to Coniston and was a camper, CIT, and staff member! However, his roots in Camp reach far deeper than that.

His grandfather, Doug Reed, was the Camp Director from 1959-1969 and was responsible for helping move Camp to Lake Coniston!

It had been sometime since Jimmy had been back to Camp, but he said he was so happy things "felt exactly like the Camp I knew and loved twelve years ago".

As well as taking photos, Jimmy had the opportunity to reflect on his journey and how Camp helped him to become an Olympian Bobsledder for Team USA.

"My story as an athlete really revolves around being resilient and not giving up. It took me eight long years to become an Olympian. I missed my shot in 2018, went through multiple surgeries, and sat through the unknown of a pandemic all to compete at the Olympics for a total of four minutes.

There were plenty of times where my journey was difficult and I didn't know if I was going to make it, but I kept on pushing towards my goal. Resiliency started at a young age for me and Camp played a major role in that. At Camp, you are always encouraged to try new, challenging things. Whether it's the ropes tower, high dive, or entering the talent show, trying new things in an atmosphere that is encouraging and safe instilled a sense of confidence that I could do difficult things. And more importantly, if you make mistakes or don't succeed at first, not only is that okay but you shouldn't give up and you should try again. I didn't give up and in 2022 I officially became an Olympian!"




Callum McCaffer married his wife, Claire, at Royal Troon in Scotland! His co-counselor, Corey Miller, was able to go across the pond to see their special day.

Jake Satow is in the band Actor Observer from Boston, MA who have become a well respected musical force throughout New England. This spring you may have seen them playing at Boston Calling!


#### **LUNA AND THE CARPETS**




### SUMMER 2024 PROJECTS ARE UNDERWAY

The completion of the new woodshop space on the ground floor of the arts & crafts center is on track to be finished in time for the summer of 2024. Construction has also begun in a meeting space in the basement of the office. As you can see from the photo to the right, the roof and rafters of the lodge porch were replaced so it can hold up for another one hundred New England winters.

In addition to these projects, plans are being made to replace the main water system located in the basement of the lodge. Water systems, while practically invisible, are the most important facility feature in all of Coniston.

These improvements are steps to bring us closer to finalizing the lodge expansion and renovation in 24/25. Plans for the lodge include an indoor/outdoor theater to maximize and enhance our drama and dance productions.
