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DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

As you read through this issue of the Chronicle, think about how you utilize relationships every day in your work, your neighborhood, and your family. The ability to create and maintain relationships is the most important skill campers practice at camp. The confidence they receive from that practice is the long-term tool they will use in their life.

On a recent phone call, a social worker and colleague described teaching adults how to cook as one of her most important programs. She stated, **"we have to teach small things if we want success."** The social worker added that teaching people how to cook isn't the intended objective - the confidence that participants gain from learning to take care of themselves is. Coniston recently began a cooking program with staff from South Africa. Just as the social worker noted with adults, the main outcome campers and staff receive is the self-confidence of knowing they can take care of themselves.

Camp doesn't offer campcraft, swimming, and drama because we

produce mountaineers, Olympians, and professional actors (although we have). We teach activities so campers can develop a sense of self and learn how to interact with others. In essence, the confidence gained from learning in public and how they relate that to other people is what makes camp special.

In my time at Coniston, we have participated in many studies to quantify what campers "receive" from attending camp - always with similar results. The study done by fellowship staff member, Libby Foley, and her mentor, Caroline Beale, is no exception. The quality and intensity of relationships they measured at Coniston are so strong they seem unbelievable. Yet, we know there's nothing more important to creating a happy and long-lived life than relationships.

SOUTH DAKOTA REFLECTIONS

TWO SUMMERS OF CIT TRIPS TO THE CHEYENNE RIVER VALLEY RESERVATION



YMCA CAMP MARROWBONE

For the past two summers, the West Coast CITs have ventured to Dupree, SD to visit the YMCA of the Seven Council Fires, the only YMCA located on a reservation. Members and staff of the Seven Council Fires graciously welcomed Coniston's next generation of counselors and gave them the opportunity to meet and learn from the Lakota people.

Neither the history of the Lakota nor the reality of reservation life is easy to digest. There is pain, but more importantly, there is joy.

Simple games like tag left everyone breathless with laughter.

"The connections that the CITs made with the campers there were so, so beautiful," said West Coast CIT Director Ainsley Conroy.

CIT Caleb Meranus recalled, "The children I met while volunteering at the YMCA in Dupree were some of the most kind, respectful and thoughtful children I had ever met."

After working at the day camp, the CITs traveled to the town of Cherry Creek to distribute meals. Next, they volunteered at the overnight camp of the Seven Council Fires: YMCA Camp Marrowbone.

At Marrowbone, camp feels a little different. It moves at a slower pace, but the fun is the same. The smiles are just as bright - Camp is Camp.

"We should definitely be sharing what we're

learning in South Dakota with the greater Coniston community," said Ainsley.

"We developed this program to show Conistonians how our camp fits into the larger picture that is the YMCA. I love sending young people to places like this because they are awestruck by the differences while simultaneously heartwarmed by the similarities. It is ultimately the sameness you feel with a person that leads you to understand your place in the world. Perhaps there is no better place to feel that than the Cheyenne River Valley Reservation," said John Tilley.

After trips to California, Arizona, Utah, and Colorado, the next stop in our West Coast CIT program is the Pacific Northwest. We will send alumni to South Dakota to continue the work begun by the CITs, and to ensure the lessons learned there will be woven into Coniston for years to come.

Music program director and founder Grace Ferguson said, "Creating music and performing music is super vulnerable and I think being able to foster an environment for young kids to try it out is super important, and I think a lot of kids don't really get that chance."

Grace, who is a member of the band Luna and the Carpets, is the latest in a long-line of Coniston musicians. Notable artists like Noah Kahan and Hans Williams honed their skills at Camp, and thanks to Grace, countless more kids will get that chance.

Grace is really hopeful the program continues. For many campers, it is their first chance to play an instrument. A lot of kids were there just to experiment. Grace noted that exposing kids to different instruments, especially at a young age, allows kids to be creative and explore in completely new ways. The very act of singing and playing music together connects us with an entirely new group of people. It is not only good for us as individuals in that we learn a new skill, it is that camp is teaching individuals a new way to connect and make new friends.

"It was just so amazing watching them grow even in the short two weeks. We had so many campers that really flourished. I think watching that was just a super rewarding experience," said Grace.

While not every camper will someday sell out Fenway Park or sign a record deal, music will always have a home at Coniston. And Camp will continue to be the first stage for generations of Conistonians to come.

In its debut summer, Martial Arts made the dance studio its dojo with campers learning Taekwondo.

Adelaide Barnes, 2021 CIT, headed up the new program area. Adelaide has won several national titles and won the USA Grand Prix for Taekwondo. As a dual citizen of the United Kingdom, she was also selected for Great Britain's Development Squad for the Olympics when she was 16.

Adelaide used her years of knowledge and experience to teach campers an entry level course in the martial arts while mixing in a healthy dose of camp fun.

Adelaide said she saw the confidence of her campers grow dramatically throughout the session. She emphasized how intimidating trying something new can be and that a discipline like Taekwondo offers no shortage of frustration when beginning.

"These campers were amazing," said Adelaide. "They showed persistence no matter what level they were at. They were always willing to try again and again! I was, and still am very proud of them."

STEP 1 

Office Moved to the Front Gate

In order to make room for the new Arts and Crafts/Woodshop area, the Office was picked up and moved to the front gate. This directs vehicle traffic away from the middle of camp. The building's new basement now holds the boardroom and offices.

STEP 2 

Arts and Crafts & Woodshop Constructed on Old Office Foundation

The new **Arts and Crafts Center** opened in the Summer of 2023, and beneath it, the **Woodshop** opened in 2024. Both programs now enjoy more space and flexibility while the Lodge has been freed up for renovations and expansion.

STEP 3 

The Lodge Renovation & Expansion Now Underway

A large multipurpose room, two much needed bathrooms, and an indoor/outdoor stage are being constructed where the old kitchen/arts and crafts once stood. This will allow all of camp to fit inside on rainy days. The flexibility of the space will allow each Division to enjoy separate activities at the same time in the middle of Camp.

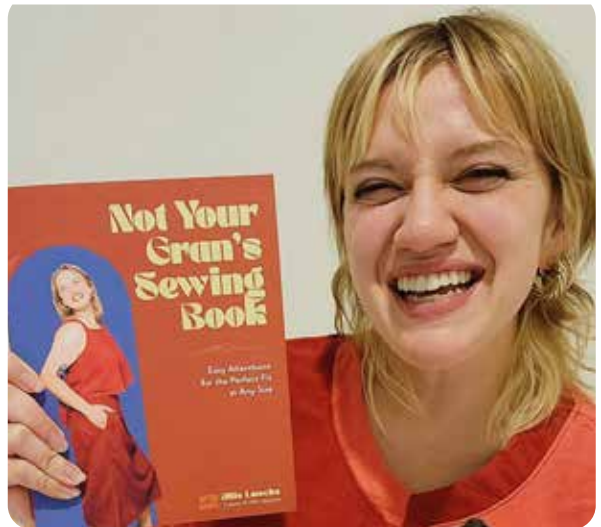

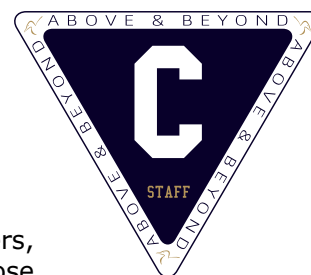

FRAN GRANDONICO AND WILL BUDINGTON

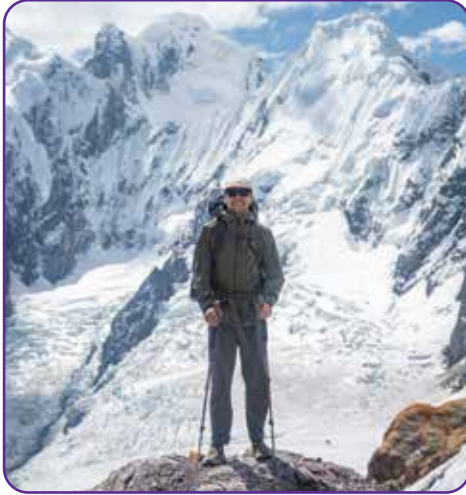

What Camp *Really* Does

Researchers study Coniston relationships and their impact

Many of us have heard about the 85-year-long Harvard study that clearly links happiness and longer lives to high-quality relationships. Most of us are aware that numerous other studies link quality relationships to similar things, including overcoming adverse experiences and healing the effects of trauma.

With these in mind staff member and Fellow, Libby Foley, and researcher Caroline Beale, set out to find what effect Camp has

on the long-term relationship skills of our campers and staff. What they found may surprise even the most avid Camp person.

Overwhelmingly the responses from campers show how connected we are at Camp. 97% indicated feeling secure asking for help, 95% felt so when talking about their feelings, and 97% felt comfortable going to adults for help while at Camp.

Why do these results really matter? Coniston supplies a social safety net. It





creates a gracious space. A space where kids enter as strangers and yet still feel comfortable trying, failing, and learning. In today's world of heaped expectations and the forever mistakes of social media, that grace is rare.

The connections campers reported with camp friends were unusually high as well. Throughout the study, campers reported that the friends they make at camp are the most genuine in their lives. Additionally, our study showed that during the offseason, camp relationships don't get left on the back burner as one might expect.

In fact, campers reported that they stay in touch regularly with their camp friends. **73%** said they are in touch with camp friends at least once a week. Kids spread all over the country and world spend 50 weeks in touch with the friends they make in two.

While we can't guarantee that attending Coniston will lengthen and improve every camper's life, it is clear that the skills gained at Camp are the ones that give children the best chance at a long and happy life.

We teach campers to swim at Coniston because one day it might save a life. In fact, we don't know how many lives have been saved because of that practice. The same is true of teaching healthy relationships. We don't know how many lives those relationships skills have improved and lengthened. We just know they have.
