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DIRECTOR'S TWO CENTS

FADS COME AND GO

Like most clichés, this one doesn't always ring true.

This spring I spoke at an adult learning class at our local college. It inspired me to re-investigate the founding of Coniston for the first time since Camp's Centennial in 2011. This year, I was struck by how differently I perceive the same information. Local YMCA work is detailed weekly in the century old newspapers and magazines, and the term "group work" is often found in the articles.

Group work is the idea that individuals grow and benefit through working with others.

I love the apparent contradiction in this definition - learning to work in a group creates more resilient individuals. I am especially attracted to the notion that self-reliance and working with others isn't an either/or proposition. A full life requires both.

The idea that a young person learns self-reliance by facing tasks with a group of friends is not a new thought for most of us. What is interesting is that this has **always** been a central motivation for Coniston.

I have realized that it was the reason our founders did **everything**. I found Perley A. Foster, the Camp Director or "County Secretary" as he was known, organizing activities between boys and girls from the different areas of Enfield, NH in 1915 for "organized play" to accomplish this exact goal. I have seen where he helped the

local schools agree upon rules to begin inter-scholastic sporting events, such as basketball. He organized parks, built playgrounds, and spoke with local groups—all with the idea of producing resilient individuals **and** creating community.

In today's world, campers come to Coniston and "unplug." This allows them to grow individually because they interact and solve problems with others in their cabin. This ranges from simply cooking dinner at an overnight to agreeing to rules as they play Gaga.

Last year, we reported on research studies from Harvard that show those with better relationships live longer, happier lives. We know from neuroscientists that each of our brains are "wired" through these relationships.

So, what's old **is** new and what began as Camp was not a fad. Research tracks it. Science proves it. Coniston delivers it.

I hope as you read this issue of the Chronicle you will keep this in mind. I hope that it helps clarify why a summer away at camp is life-changing for so many Conistonians.

FROM MIDDLELERS TO MIDDLE SCHOOL

A CONVERSATION WITH MIDDLE SCHOOL
PRINCIPAL KARTAL JAQUETTE



"I don't think Denver Green School Northfield exists as a school without Coniston."

When starting his career as a teacher, Kartal Jaquette said he instinctively used his Coniston experience. He brought in aspects from Camp to create positive and energetic experiences.

When he transitioned from teacher to Principal of Denver Green School Northfield (DGS) in Denver, CO, Kartal realized just how much he had been taking from Coniston. In his new role, he decided to double-down. He would maximize joy the same way he had at Camp. Because middle school is a lot

like camp - if you make it that way.

"Middle School is this huge crossroads where students are just starting to understand their identity and they're so socially sensitive, but they don't even know that they're socially sensitive. So they're just really vulnerable, and that's why a lot of them struggle. What we needed to do was create something where kids could be their authentic selves," said Kartal.

How did he do it? One of the things

Kartal described is called Friday Celebration, which consists of games and competitions designed to get kids having fun and being comfortable in front of their peers.

"There's all this positive energy and then it feels like it's a safe place to take risks. Whereas the traditional school model feels like it's a very unsafe place to take risks and be your authentic self. *Will I get teased? Will I get made fun of?* So we do a karaoke contest because, yeah, middle school should have more karaoke contests! The idea is to get people to cheer, just like they would at summer camp."

Kartal said that kids participating in these games, and feeling brave enough to do so, directly translates to the classroom. A kid who sings in front of their friends is more likely to raise their hand in front of them too. That feeling of confidence among one's peers is vital for real learning to get done. Kids often feel weighed down by expectations. They think they should know everything already and get everything right on the first try. But when shown in a safe environment that they can try *and* fail, then learn how to succeed, they become better students, peers, and leaders.

"I think there was always the assumption that surely the more established school

that's been around longer, that doesn't identify as 'the fun school', is the more serious academic school," said Kartal.

But that assumption has been proven false. Out of 77 secondary schools in Denver, DGS scored the highest in the most recent school report card with 94.7 out of 100.

"I would just absolutely give Coniston a lot of credit for that as well. I don't think Denver Green School Northfield exists as a school without Coniston."

Academic success is important, but behavior is another central pillar of schooling. One that is often the hardest to build during the middle school years. That's yet another question Kartal answered using Coniston. He calls it an attitude multiplier effect.

"The big thing that we get, the big thing that Coniston gets, is that it's not that Cabin Night was a victory, and it's not that Opening Campfire was a victory. [The victory was] the way that they shifted people's mindsets so they then could be a better version of themselves. Then they're connecting with someone else who's a better version of themselves. I think that sometimes people think that if you're not getting the result you want with a middle school age student that you need to restrict them more. And the answer is actually no. If you're



not getting the answer you want with a middle schooler, you need to compel them more. Engage them and excite them more. Because they're totally willing to be bought in, they just have to believe it."

Kartal put this theory into direct action. Before the start of classes, each grade has a week of what he calls "excursions."

"We do overnights. We roast s'mores. We do camping, you know? And you think back to Coniston, and you do your cabin overnight, and you do those things, and everyone's a little nervous, but then you end up staying up and telling stories and having fun. People are nice to each other when they're roasting s'mores, but they're not necessarily nice to each other when they're passing each other in the hallway. So you want to create those positive moments."

It takes time, but there is a slow momentum that Kartal captures.

"The kids are nervous, but like many things in life you feel nervous before you do something important and cool."

By the time school is in rhythm the students are bought in. Kartal watches for smiles and relaxed shoulders in the halls. He laughs, jokes, and says hi to students. He does just what he would do at Camp.

"I've become increasingly reflective of what did Coniston do? What does a camp do? My feedback to schools would just be that you should think more about a different model, like a summer camp. There's probably more ways that you could make your school similar to a summer camp if you really thought about it."

The YMCA is approaching its 175th anniversary and together the more than 2,700 YMCAs represent one of the largest nonprofits in the US. YUSA's archives are housed at the University of Minnesota.

FELLOWSHIPS

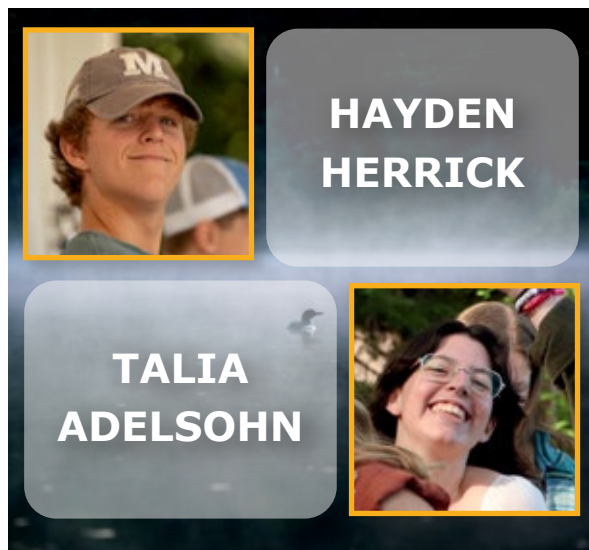

"I can't wait to work with the LITs to create awesome evening programs," said Ryan. "It's going to be amazing to bring new ideas to life and see everyone having a blast!"

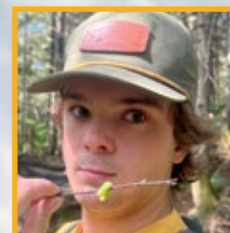

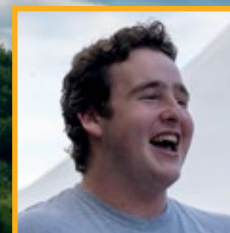

BUILDING THE FUTURE

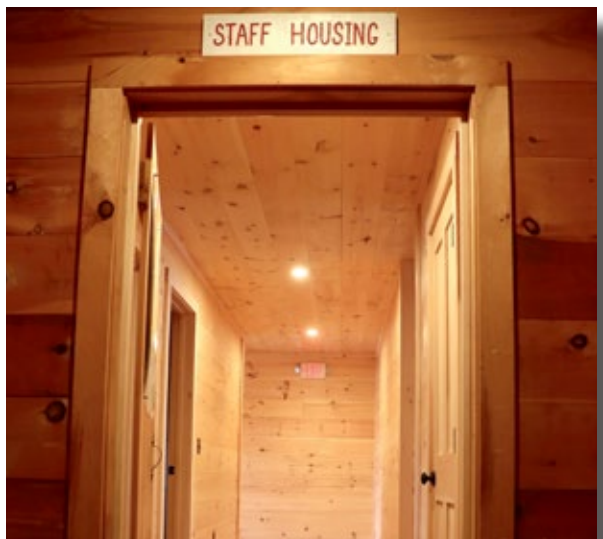
